Chairman's Address John McDonald



I want to start by thanking the Newsletter team for their tremendous work on the club's annual Newsletter. Since its inception seven years ago, this publication has been a marvellous success story of which the club is immensely proud.

Every year brings with it changes and new challenges, but I do not think that this time last year, anyone could have predicted what was to unfold and how our lives and sport would be impacted. Our games were suspended, and club grounds and facilities were forced to close. Things were bleak during the period through April and into May, and it looked for a time that there might be no games for the 2020 season. However, by early June we slowly began to see green shoots with the announcement from Croke Park of a 'return to play' roadmap.

As you will see from match reports later on in the Newsletter, our underage remains vibrant. We had over 110 children compete in the ever-popular Kellogg's GAA Cúl camp in August. Our U14 boys reached the final of the West B division and were narrowly beaten by a good Balla team, while our other teams all continued to show improvements. It is important to recognise and say thank you to the underage management and coaches. It is pleasing to see the hard work, commitment and dedication you have, and you deserve the full support and encouragement of the club.

Thank you to the Ladies' club for continuing to promote and develop ladies' football in our club and community. It is great to see our girls get the opportunity and encouragement to play football and become more active. As the "20x20.i.e." women in sport initiative say, "If she can't see it she can't be it". I would caution, though, that we should not get complacent about the underage setup and that new parents are encouraged to get involved in the coaching at this level. In particular, we need more women involved in the coaching of our girl's teams. We need to promote our club and identify and introduce new families in the community to Kilmeena GAA.

For the men's Junior team there was no County League. The team competed in the Michael Walsh League, but additional restrictions imposed by the Government and Croke Park at the end of October, prompted the cancellation of the competition.

In October, the team reached the final of the Junior Championship in McHale Park. Unfortunately, on this occasion it was not to be, losing out to Kilmaine by the narrowest of margins. However, they went on a few weeks later, ending the season by winning the Cusack cup for the third year running, in one of the best displays of football produced by this team when they beat Achill in the final played in Islandeady. I do not doubt that with continued determination and focus from the players, and support from within the club, that a County Junior title and promotion into the Intermediate ranks is not far away. This match concluded the season for the team and that of the outgoing management team of John Reilly, Darren Madden and Davy Feehan. On behalf of the club, I would like to thank each of them for their hard work, effort and commitment over the past three years. By now you will be aware the club Executive has appointed a new Senior team management of John Reilly as manager, with a backroom team of Eoin Sweeney, John Doherty and Peter Carney for a three-year term and I wish them the best of luck in their roles.

Our main playing pitch has now been drained, levelled and reseeded, with nearly 13kms of drains laid underneath the surface, and the benefits should last a lifetime. With an improved playing surface, there will be a significant increase in the availability of the pitch during poor weather, especially at the start and end of the season. To finance the development, the recently formed club "Finance Committee" launched the "Ball on the Wall" fundraiser.

To fundraise for the development, the finance committee launched "Ball on the Wall". This initiative allows for the name of an individual, a family or a loved one, to be inscribed on a granite ball to be permanently displayed on the wall of the stand. I am pleased to say that support for this fundraiser has been positive, and the first pieces of granite will be erected shortly. Thank you to everyone who has kindly donated so far. There are still opportunities to subscribe, and anyone who would like to do so can contact a member of the Finance committee. This enterprise is an investment in the future of the club and that of our children and grandchildren.

Thank you to Councillors John O'Malley and Brendan Mulroy whom both contributed €5,000 and to Christy Hyland who contributed €2,000 to the club. Thank you also to Donal McIntyre for his continued sponsorship of our annual club newsletter.

Another development during the year was the movement online of our lotto draw, which may now be played within the club's website. A letterbox and lotto envelope dispenser has been installed at the side of the clubhouse porch for anyone who still likes the traditional method. Thanks to all who support our lotto and to those people, at home and abroad, who continue to support our club financially or in any other way.

One of the great positives to come out of COVID-19 was the club match-day radio, 'KGAA'. Thank you to all involved and the excitement you brought into the homes of our members far and near. I hope to see this exciting addition to the club grow and flourish into the future. It has also been great to see a new dynamic, "Healthy Club" committee set up and never more important to focus in on the physical and mental wellbeing of our community. The "Healthy Club" committee comprises of Noreen Johnston, Julie Moore, Mark Ryan and Noleen Coughlan. Watch out for more information on social media as plans are well underway to see the launch of the club 'No Smoking' policy and an 'Operation Transformation' event along with information around our "Wellbeing and Mental Health".

We held a successful AGM on Sunday 6th December, albeit from our sitting rooms and kitchen tables, as this year the AGM took place online. Thank you to all who attended and took on the roles to administer and guide our club for the coming season Thank you to all those in the club who helped out in any way during the year. No matter how small a job may seem, it is significant and

makes our club a stronger and more enjoyable place for all.

On behalf of the club, I wish to extend my deepest sympathy to club members and those in the wider community who lost loved ones over the past year, in particular, I would like to remember club stalwarts, Jim Browne and John Moran who both passed away recently. These men gave so much during their involvement, and the club is a better place because of them. May they all rest in peace. I would also like to wish anybody that is sick in our parish at the moment a speedy recovery.

As another year draws to a close, I would like to wish all our members, players, supporters, sponsors and friends at home and abroad, a very happy and peaceful Christmas with health and best wishes for the New Year. We look forward to another exciting season for Cill Mhíodhna in 2021.

The Under 18 (Minors) began training in early February. Following the publication of the Bord na nÓg fixtures/divisions, Kilmeena was placed in Division 2 of the County League. Road to the County Final Sean Barrett, Club PRO



In a year where uncertainty spanned across the world, it was great to get the chance to have the Junior Championship this summer during the pandemic.

Following the Championship draw in early March Kilmeena were paired with three North Mayo teams, Killala, Lacken and Ballycroy in Group 2 of the County Junior Championship.

First up was a trip to Killala on a wet bank holiday Saturday in August. This game was expected to be the most challenging in the group, but things didn't pan out that way as Kilmeena raced into an early lead and pulled away from their opponents comfortably in the first half playing some excellent football. Killala did stage a bit of a secondhalf comeback, but the mountain was too steep for them to climb and we came away with a deserving 2-18 to 2-8 win.

The following weekend we welcomed Lacken to Breaffy, as this was now our delegated home venue due to the ongoing pitch developments at our home venue, St Brendan's Park. A few changes in the team from the first outing didn't affect things as Kilmeena secured a very comfortable 3-20 to 0-2 win and booked their spot in the knockout stages.

We played Ballycroy in the final round of the group stages for the third year in a row in McGovern Park, Newport.

This match turned out to be a real physical encounter, but Kilmeena showed their class and experience to emerge 3-10 to 1-3 winners to top Group 2. Things were heating up and as we came down to the last eight of the competition and we were drawn against West Mayo rivals, Achill in Westport.

Historically, Achill and Kilmeena meetings have proved to be entertaining encounters. The expectations were no different in this instance, and what a battle it proved to be. The first half was nip-and-tuck for the first 15 or 20 minutes before Niall Ryan's goal put some daylight between the sides going into the break. In the second half, Kilmeena played some great football, and Achill battled back, but it wasn't enough, and in the end, Kilmeena prevailed by four points to set up a fourth semi-final in five years.

All roads led to Islandeady for an unusual behind-closed-doors semi-final against Shrule/Glencorrib. Under normal circumstances, a considerable number of supporters would be the norm. Alas, empty stadia is now the standard. The dugout side of Islandeady pitch was a picture of media personnel from both clubs as Shrule/Glencorrib had a live stream of the game while our very own KGAA Radio was supplying audio commentary around the world. This game was said to be one of the best Junior Championship semi-finals in recent times as both teams gave it everything and put on an exhibition of entertaining football. The first half was score-for-score but the teams couldn't be separated at the break, leaving the sides 1-8 a-piece at half time. The battling performance in the second half from Kilmeena must be credited, having twice lost a player to black cards, they didn't panic! At stages in the second half Shrule/Glencorrib pushed on, but Kilmeena weathered the storm and

kept tipping away. A vital goal from Niall Ryan in the last quarter proved pivotal in the end, and Kilmeena's experience showed as they got over the line to record a 2-14 to 1-14 victory. There were great scenes of emotion and jubilation at the final whistle as we booked a County Final place for the first time in 18 long years. Too long!

The build-up around Kilmeena, Carraholly, Fahy and the surrounding areas was great to see, the place decked out in black and white flags, posters and bunting. The team were very thankful and appreciated the support they received.

It was unfamiliar territory for many of the team besides the few stalwarts who had been there before. The atmosphere in training was great for the two weeks before the final with everyone pushing themselves for the same cause. KGAA Radio, along with other media personnel were on hand for pre-match interviews to get a flavour of the atmosphere for those who couldn't be in McHale Park. Thankfully the government restrictions lifted somewhat, and one hundred spectators were allowed from each club into the grounds. But if this had been a normal year, you would have expected to see a couple of hundred Kilmeena faithful at the game. Those who couldn't get a ticket tuned into KGAA Radio and Mayo GAA TV.

It was a perfect day for football, and McHale Park was in superb condition. The hard work had been completed, and the lads were ready for battle. Kilmaine raced into an early four-point lead, but Kilmeena settled before the first water break thanks to a super goal from Joey Smyth. A strong second quarter from the lads left them two points up at the break, 1-6 to 0-7. The second half was tight for long periods, and Kilmaine did have their purple patch. Still, Kilmeena's never-say-die attitude was on show again, but unfortunately, we came up short by a single point this time around on a scoreline of 1-13 to 1-12, a heartbreaking defeat.

It was a privilege to be involved in this squad. The attitude and hunger are there, and I do not doubt that Kilmeena will come back even stronger next year to challenge for the Pete McDonnell Cup. Massive thanks must go to the players and management who gave the community a tremendous morale lift in these unprecedented times.

KGAA Radio Debut! Martin McIntrye



Many noteworthy milestones denote the development of the Kilmeena GAA Club since its foundation in 1889. However, few will compare with the events of 2020 in various respects. The Covid-19 pandemic that we are all familiar with now and its global consequences, wreaking havoc on every aspect of society, as its exponential spread caused alarm with every transmitted news bulletin. GAA clubs throughout the country were no exception to the disruptions it caused, which manifested in cancellations and abandonment of match fixtures at every level, limiting competitions to all but the barest involvement to complete the seasons' fixtures.

It's funny how it sometimes takes a crisis of such local and global magnitude to inspire and harness the imagination and creative potential of groups and individuals, enabling communities to pull together for the good of all. Likewise with Kilmeena GAA Club. The social restrictions imposed by the government to suppress and curb the spread of the deadly virus meant that attendance at football matches was strictly limited to a small number of patrons, or in some cases to management and players only. This, in turn, disenfranchised many supporters, whose only option in keeping abreast of match scores depended on reviews from local radio, or text messages from those lucky enough to be afforded access to the game, as well as regular score updates on social media. A meagre alternative to a sport that depends to a great extent on spectator participation in

creating atmosphere and motivation for players and management.

This void heralded the launch of KGAA Radio!

Recently appointed Chairman, John McDonald, asked if I would chair a "Communications Group" he had proposed to establish, to evaluate the degree of communication within and outside of the club. The group principally consisted of those involved in the production of the popular annual club Newsletter with some extra welcomed additions. Among other ideas proffered at our brainstorming sessions was the idea of broadcasting match commentaries. At that point (mid-January) our thoughts were to primarily serve the Kilmeena diaspora, a sizable audience as reflected through the club's social media outlets - website, FaceBook and Twitter accounts. This idea gained further impetus following a club Officer Training Workshop in McHale Park, organised by the County Board Executive. The workshop facilitated the training and development of newly appointed club officers from around the County to familiarise them with the duties of their respective posts-a very welcome and worthwhile development for club executives. I attended, with other club officers in my capacity as Chairman of the newly formed communication group, a beneficial decision as it turned out to be. At that meeting, the club PRO, Sean Barrett and I had an interesting conversation with the Chairman of Kiltane GAA club Ciaran O'Hara, an expert in communications gained from his experience while working

with Sky Sports. Following on from that discussion in McHale Park, an additional private meeting was arranged with Ciaran, whose inspired contribution and direction on the basic requirements needed for successful broadcast transmission established the basis for the initiative that was to become KGAA Radio.

And so it began! The quest for the team to coordinate and broadcast match commentaries that would inform, excite and entertain audiences at home and abroad, took on a greater dimension than the initial idea intended. The onset of the Covid-19 pandemic and its significant travel restrictions increased the urgency of relieving the trauma of home "incarceration" for Kilmeena GAA supporters, as described by some commentators. It was now no longer just targeting the Kilmeena diaspora, but was now encompassing our indigenous audience as well. Previous video (old VHS tape recordings for all you who can still recall those heady days) recordings in the early to mid-nineties, with some excellent commentary performances from the likes of Jim Keane and Tony Mulroy, are historically archived and digitised for future generations to peruse. A new style of radio broadcast applied in this case. One name kept popping up as the most suitable local commentator to fulfil the position, namely, Mickey Carney! And boy, were we rewarded in spades with our choice! Mickey's interest and enthusiasm could scarcely be contained when first approached to canvass his opinion for the project.

Unbeknownst to us, we were fortunate to have some talent lying dormant in our midst, in the form of club registrar, Damien Hughes. Damian had previously produced and presented programmes for local radio in Dublin before his arrival to Kilmeena. A visit to his home confirmed his interest in coming on board, while his wife Shona's expertise in Facebook marketing provided further assurance in the implementation of the project. What luck, we had a commentator and a producer on board! One afternoon, whilst pondering the addition of a technical guru, I sat contemplating out my living room window on the majestic Croagh Patrick, when my gaze fell on the home of my next-door neighbour Robert Moran. Initial approaches to discern his interest was met with equal enthusiasm to join the team. While discussing the technical aspect of our requirements he happened to mention the arrival of another equally and imminently qualified producer/presenter of radio programs into Roscahill, Isla Hoe. Isla had just completed a Masters in Computers and Electronics Engineering in Trinity College Dublin. For three years, during her tenure at Trinity College, Isla produced and presented Trinity Radio FM. What a find!

All set to go, we had a production team consisting of: Martin McIntyre, Coordinator; Mickey Carney, Commentator; Damian Hughes, Producer; Isla Hoe - Technical Consultant; Robert Moran, Technical Administrator; club PRO, Sean Barrett; Event Supervisor, Kevin Barrett. Neil O'Donnell was later to join as match pundit.

Following several meetings working through the minutiae and interesting sequential details required for successful radio productions, the first privately recorded rehearsal was scheduled for Breaffy one evening in June, where Kilmeena played Breaffy in the U-16s boys' County Championship. Any lingering doubts or anxieties regarding the success of the venture were permanently laid to rest that evening.

His enthusiasm finally unleashed, and at breakneck speed, Mickey launched into a descriptive commentary of the game that would do justice, and in most cases surpass other more experienced professional commentators. Within minutes of his opening team introductions, the small number of spectators present gravitated to within earshot of his commentary position such was the impact and appeal of his account of events taking place on the field. Mickey's commentary was spiced with anecdotes, tales and stories relating to players from both teams, whose fathers, uncles, aunts or any other related facts that may have contributed in any small way to past glories of either club. Mickey's style of narrative was indicative of the meticulous background preparation he employed for his commentary. The same attention to detail was implemented and expanded in all subsequent broadcasts. Mickey's speed of thought concerning player recognition, including substitutions, was to become one of the hallmarks of the smooth, seamless, uninterrupted flow of his performances. Those skills were honed with every ensuing broadcast for the duration of the Junior Championship, establishing a unique and a somewhat breathless and hectic style of commentary. "KGAA Radio" was here to stay; a phenomenon was created!

Right by his side was his ever-vigilant Production Team, as mentioned earlier, Damian Hughes, Isla Hoe and Robert Moran. As production coordinator, it was illuminating to witness the scrupulous attention paid to the minute detail required for every moment, from the broadcast opening, counting down the minutes to the throw-in, and again at each of the water breaks, including the half time period. The



same conscientious observance to detail applied to all of our post-match debriefings. Any problems or snags that arose from the previous production were quickly rectified and improved upon for the next occasion.

The producers' responsibilities extend to ensuring that the commentator is aware of each previously rehearsed detail and its air timing, during the performance. Robert's quiet, relaxed personality ensured the technical transmission was relayed seamlessly to the listening audience at home and abroad. One moment of hilarity worth mentioning occurred during the County Junior Final between Kilmeena and Kilmaine in McHale Park. The transmission came to a sudden stop when the commentator, in the peak of his excitement ventured beyond the limit of his "technical tether", disconnecting him momentarily from the newscast apparatus, causing immediate panic within his production team. However, the ever-vigilant quick-thinking Robert quickly rectified this momentary loss of transmission.

At this point, it would be remiss of me not to acknowledge the cooperation of the referees and opposing teams throughout the championship matches in presenting for the usual pre-match photographs in good time, as games needed to start as programmed to facilitate the ensuing commentary.

Following the "the Breaffy experiment", it became evident that the commentator required periodic support in his task in the form of specific analysis of events as they unfolded on the field of play. Into this role stepped Neil O'Donnell. His experience and astute awareness of tactical moves adopted by each side did not escape his eagle-eyed attention. His shrewd comments and critique of developments as the game progressed, brought clarity for listeners to the match that might otherwise be missed by the commentator. An added benefit to Neil's addition to the broadcasting team presented itself by way of stalling the pace and intensity of the commentary, by allowing the commentator to catch his breath before the next wave of detailed embroidered eloquence. This matching pair proved a perfect balance for each other during the game. The incredibly positive feedback garnered from social media outlets, individuals, private phone calls, local comments and other messages of support, confirmed the benefits and success of "KGAA Radio".

As the various championship matches progressed, and aware of the Covid social restrictions in place, the commitment of informing and connecting with those

cocooning at home and abroad took on an added significance. Now don't get me wrong, the value of video and TV as means of communication are not to be underestimated when available. In its absence, the listeners must rely on quality radio commentary. And in Mickey Carney "KGAA Radio" commentator extraordinaire, delivered a detailed and vivid account of the play as it developed, describing an image for listeners which kept them glued to their devices. His unique style of performance, coupled with the efficiency and ease with which he switched between the "cúpla focal as Gaeilge" embellished with entertaining anecdotes, set him apart as a gifted communicator which endeared him to his audience. His impartial and equal interest in acknowledging the efforts and exploits of the opposing teams contributed to a balanced presentation of the play. His unfettered passion and enthusiasm for his task, coupled with his richness of vocabulary became his trademark with every game.

Talk about announcing yourself onto the big stage!

It's important to acknowledge that the support and cooperation for this project had the unanimous approval of the club officers and its membership, including the team management and players who embraced the idea from its inception. A special thanks to club PRO, Sean Barrett. His constant information-flow made a considerable contribution to the success of the program. Also, it's essential to recognise the assistance of the team's "Stage Manager", Kevin Barrett, and his "Van". Ever ready to help whenever the need arose, which happened on a couple of crucial occasions, not to mention the steady supply of hot beverages and "goodies" for the commentary team throughout the championship. A special thank you to the GAA clubs and McHale Park, in accommodating our request for the use of their facilities to broadcast the games. A personal word of gratitude to Viviana Giovannetti and Brendan Ruane, whose home lies adjacent to the Islandeady GAA grounds, in permitting us to use their domestic Internet and power connections for the County Junior Semi-Final. Your generosity is much appreciated.

The club would sincerely wish to thank Padraic Carney (Mickey's brother) for all his sponsorship towards the costings involved in the making of the programme.

Lastly, we should wish to thank all the people for their messages of support for the duration of the championship. In particular, those who tuned in from around the globe - your kind words of encouragement made the project worthwhile.

"KGAA Radio" has become one of the more positive side effects of the Covid-19 pandemic. Roll on 2021 for more of the same.

NEW BEGINNINGS Philip and Kathleen Murphy, The Old Schoolhouse, Kilmeena

New beginnings are exciting as well as a bit scary. Our children had flown the nest, and we decided that we were just about young enough for the next 'adventure' in our lives. So what was that to be?

We had a plan: to move house. Something completely different. Something up or down the East coast not too far from Dublin where we had lived for over forty years, and something big enough to take our five children and grandchildren when they came to visit - a two-bedroom apartment was not in the mix! The East coast proved impossible both in choice and budget, so the plan changed.

After much thought, many investigations, many changes of mind and for no particular reason, Westport came up in conversation. Memories of camping with the children and friends in Westport House over thirty years ago came flooding back. Why not?

So, armed with an internet-sourced list of possible homes, we arrived in Westport over the Whit weekend 2013 to look things over. The first house we entered was, believe it or not, the Old Schoolhouse here in Kilmeena. It was love at first sight!

It's fair to say it bore little resemblance to the original four-roomed Schoolhouse of 1925 or the Western Health Board respite house, or of the Youth Hostel, or of the Creche and all the other things that it had been in the course of its history! So it was with a mixture of anticipation and trepidation that we opened the door of the Old Schoolhouse on the morning of Friday, November 1st 2013 with over forty years of our lives packed in large brown boxes. (Kathleen's mother always said it was good luck to move house on a Friday.)

When the removal men had left to go back to Dublin, we looked at the walls of storage boxes stacked three deep and over six feet high all over the house and wondered where to start. So we lit the fire, sat down and opened a bottle of wine. Tomorrow was another day. But our peace was soon disturbed by the front doorbell. On the doorstep was a neighbour from up the road with a bunch of flowers, a box of chocolates and a bottle of wine. What a welcome! And seven years later that welcome sees no sign of diminishing. They were thorough, those removal men, when they packed us up in Dublin. Our daughter, down to help, discovered a single piece of Weetabix carefully wrapped in bubble wrap at the bottom of one of the boxes marked 'Kitchen.' Over the next few weeks, the walls of boxes got smaller, and shelves, cupboards and bookcases began to fill up.

We were relatively well insulated over the next few months as all our energies went into the house and then the garden. When some 'manners' were put on both we began to look outside to explore where we had chosen to live.

One of the advantages of living in the Schoolhouse is that we keep meeting people whose parents went to school here and, indeed, many who had been here themselves. There are lots of memories and stories in this place - some good and some not so good, and people are all so willing to tell them! It gives us a sense of connection to Kilmeena and a great sense of community and belonging.

For over forty years our interest and hobbies have centered around amateur drama and choral singing, and we were afraid that we might have to leave these joys behind in Dublin. But I soon discovered Kilmeena Drama Group just two hundred metres from our front door! And a bit further down the road in Newport, Kathleen found Cór Mhaigh Eo. With rehearsals and performances, our winter evenings were full and active.

Within a short time, we got to know many people. They say that if you put a group of people together on a stage in front of an audience, you get to know and trust those people very well indeed! And so our circle of friends and acquaintances grows ever wider. It's easy when those people you meet are warm and welcoming when they're interested and interesting, encouraging, happy to see you and talk to you about the place they have chosen to live. Many have lived here all their lives: full of stories of places, people, and the history of the land.

Do we miss Dublin? We don't miss the city too much. We do miss some very good friends. But we haven't moved to Australia, and we have a steady stream of visitors, most of whom envy us in our new adventure.

And so the adventure continues and each day brings something new and exciting discovering a new place, a new beach, a new view, meeting new people, new characters, new histories - all the things that make our new home a happy and exciting new beginning.



An Ancient Parish

Ollie Mulchrone takes us on a brief tour of two of Kilmeena's best-known landmarks, St. Brendan's Well & Castleaffey

Saint Brendan's Well

St. Brendan's holy well is located at the townland of Moyna, in the Parish of Kilmeena. An outer stone wall of approximately three feet in height surrounds the well on all four sides. The Eastern facing wall has an opening to provide access into the well. The well itself is circular in shape with a diameter and depth of approximately two feet. The side walls are lined with stone. This well is reputed to have once changed the sex of a new-born girl. Folklore has it that the O'Malley clan were being slaughtered on Clare Island down to the last man. A heavily pregnant woman fled the slaughter and landed on the shore in Kilmeena. Having given birth to a baby girl, she met with Saint Brendan and told him her woes. St Brendan agreed to baptise the child at this location in Moyna and having dipped the baby in the water the sex was changed to a boy, thus preserving the bloodline of the O'Malley clan.

St. Brendan's well has been visited and written about for many years with articles from Historians like John O'Donovan1806-1862, and Richard Pococke who visited the site while touring Ireland in 1752.

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Castleaffey

It is believed that Castleaffey was built towards the end of the medieval period, prior to the 1500's. Local tradition explains the name "Affey" belonging to one of the Burkes. Edmund MacTibbott, who was a minor Chieftain, resided here at Castleaffey. The 18th Lord of the Mayo Burkes, Sir Richard Burke (d. 1583) married the infamous Grainne O Malley (1530 – 1603) better known as Grainne Uaile. Their son Tibbot na Long Bourke (1567 – 1629) was fostered to Edmund MacTibbott who lived in Castleaffey. Later Tibbot moved to live with Myles McEvilly at Kinturk Castle in the barony of Carra. Fostering was more common then than it is today and with the hectic political lives of both Tibbot parents, Sir Richard and Grainne, there was little time they could devote to his upbringing. It was important for Tibbot to receive affection, discipline and a grounded education along with learning the skills and techniques of warfare, leadership and diplomacy. Tibbot na Long Burke was an Irish peer, parliamentarian and member of the Irish House of Commons. He became the first Viscount of Mayo.

Fulmar Petrel gives a graphic description in "Grania Uaile" (London 1895), pp 39-43 of Kilmeena Castle (Castleaffey). Grainne is coming into the castle.

...The outworks passed, they enter the keep. The central hall, dimly lighted by one heavily mullioned window high up in the eastern wall, was surrounded by a gallery from which hung arms, swords, pikes, shields while on the walls were matchlocks and powder-horns mounted in polished brass. The centre of the room was occupied by a table of dark red wood brought from the Spanish Main. Dressers benches and chairs

were there for goodly company. From the heavy rafters of the oak ceiling an iron lamp hung by chains of grotesque design, while at each side of the high fireplace iron brackets for torches of bog-wood were fixed to the walls. The dry rushes with which the floor was strewn gave out an agreeable odour and mingled with the smell of smoke from the turf smouldering on the hearth which was a necessary adjunct of an Irish home.

Ascending by one of the stone staircases in the thickness of the wall, we enter a spacious chamber with a limestone mullioned window opening towards the bay, through which a flood of light poured from the sun, now sinking towards the Western sea.

In the opposite wall of the castle a window of similar structure looked out upon the sedgy swamp to the Eastward. The apartment was divided by an Oak screen into a sleeping and living room. Oak wainscoting lined walls, which were here and there adorned the old flags taken from wrecks or captured in war – faded flags of several nationalities, all suggested strange histories, could they speak of the scenes over which they had last waved. From the groined stone roof hung two silver lamps, and on the embroidered seats lay some rich silks. This was the woman's apartment, where no man ever entered except, he was a near relative.

The only openings in the Southern and Northern walls of the castle, which were those most exposed to attack, were loopholes or narrow slits, which gave some dim light to the passage in the thickness of the walls.



Leaving the woman's apartment by the door in either window niche, we can ascend to the floor above by one of these hidden stairways.

Here several small chambers, occupying the whole width of the castle, provided sleeping accommodation to the men of the household and from these there was easy access to the battlemented roof.

From this lofty viewpoint we can look down on the glassy bay inside the islands, where men in boats were busy loading the ship, the still evening air broken by their shouting and the creaking of pullies and clatter of oars. On the land side the castle bawn or court was protected by a swamp and afforded room for outoffices of various kinds – stores, stables, and the dwelling of the Scotch warders of the castle. Standing as the castle did between a swamp and sore of the creek, the most vulnerable points in its position were the approaches from the North and from the South. Here walls and loop-holed towers stood as outworks, but the real strength of the fortress lay in the immensely strong masonry of the keep and in the fact that the owners held command of the sea. Outside the fortifications were numerous skin-coloured cabins of the Kerne, herdsmen, and such like, whose business it was to tend to the cattle on the island and on the vast pastures which extended inland, or when occasion required, to take a matchlock, pike, or battle-axe, and man the galleys for any desperate undertaking. On the other fortifications several pieces of cannon known as falcons were mounted, and on the battlemented keep two long Spanish four-pounders of brass shone bright in the sunshine. Kilmeena Castle, though not very large as many of those the ruins of which on see in the more central portions of the country, was a fortress of no mean strength, and stood there defying the invader and both protecting and dominating the people who looked up to it as the centre of their world.

Tradition says that Castleaffey was attacked by cannonballs, some of which have been found by locals in the past.

There is something uniquely Irish in the way the local GAA club is woven into the fabric of every parish and the life of its community. It's something that's just there, and you can't quite explain it. Over the years, various GAA projects have helped to reinforce this sense. Now the GAA Healthy Club Initiative hopes to bring a new focus on the parish and broader community which our club serves. The aim of the Healthy Club Initiative is "to ensure that everyone who engages with their GAA Club benefits from the experience in a health-enhancing way, be they players, officers, coaches, parents, supporters, or members of their local community." For our club, it provides a means of bringing together club, parish and the wider community in various activities to enhance the social, physical and mental health and wellbeing of everyone involved.

Achieving Healthy Club status doesn't happen overnight. In fact, it's an eighteen-month process of club and community review and assessment. Once complete, Kilmeena GAA Club will boast the title of Healthy Club for a period of four years.



PLAY YOUR PART IN YOUR CLUB'S FUTURE

Club Strategic Plan Update Willie Keaveney

Three simple questions were considered during the introduction of our club Strategic Plan 2020 -2023

(1) What do we do?

(2) For whom do we do it?

(3) How can we excel?

I will try and answer those questions as briefly as I can.

1) We organise and play Gaelic Games in which the Mission, Vision and Values of the organisation are espoused and nurtured.

2) We do what we do for ourselves, our children, our grandchildren, and for future generations to come.

3) We will excel only when our facilities are up to an acceptable standard and when our players want to take ownership of what they do and are proud of where they come from and whom they represent.

These principles set the context for the recent upgrading of our main playing pitch, and why it was necessary to undertake the drainage groundworks as carried out.

Heavy rains for the last number of years rendered our pitch unplayable at various times during the season due to excess water saturation. Apart from this overload of surface water posing a serious danger of injury to visiting and home players, it also meant we were unable to complete the U21 Club Championship for those years. A result of this involved conceding home advantage as well as hiring pitches in Ballyheane and Bekan to conclude the competition. An unacceptable consequence for the club.

The benefits of a proper drainage system can be assessed from the recently constructed training pitch whose surface withstands all types of inclement weather despite consistent use throughout the year. Everything considered the consensus by the club was that the main pitch should be drained to the same exacting standard which would extend its availability on an ongoing, year-round basis.

Covid-19 presented an opportunity which just had to be grasped. With all league games cancelled and with one home game in the Championship, the club decided to proceed with the drainage of the pitch.

The club would wish to thank John Foran, of Emerald Pitch Development, for his direction and expertise with the project. We want to thank the O'Carroll brothers and our groundsman, Paul Feehan, working long hours on a fine, dry weekend to get the drains installed.

The hurlers on the ditch will tell you that Kilmeena had the finest pitch in Mayo and that there was absolutely no need for drainage works. The same people don't attend any meetings or provide any visible support to the club. They will also tell you that they do not support the "Ball on the Wall" initiative for one reason or another. The club thanks everyone who has supported the fundraiser so far. Those who have made serious donations towards the development. Those who have put their money upfront and those who have signed up for weekly payments.

I want to thank the people of the Parish for their support for the project so far, and assure you that this project will be completed without recourse to any Bank loans thus avoiding any financial repayment obligations on present or future club executives.
