CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS Willie Keaveney



Welcome to the Club's 6th Annual Newsletter.

The Newsletter started as an ambitious project six years ago – with about six pages in total – of Club-related anecdotes and triumphs. Today it is more than 30 pages, full of news and events from within the Club. It is pleasing to see how it has evolved, and let us hope it continues to grow.

The Club considers the Newsletter as a great source of information for parents, players, and the community in general, and we have taken steps to ensure that the Club will continue with the Newsletter for the foreseeable future. The Club is indebted to the production team of Ollie Mulchrone, Martin McIntyre, Barry Murphy, John McDonald, Majella O'Malley, Mel King, Mairead Durkan, Maura Hastings, Trish and Sarah Hogan, Noleen Coughlan and Sean Barrett, for their trojan work in preparing this year's issue of the Newsletter. We are indeed indebted to them for

their dedication and hard work, and we hope that the content is reflective of the past year's activities and accomplishments of the Club. The Club's Annual General Meeting was held on Saturday, November 23rd. By now you will be aware that there is a new Chairman, John McDonald, and a new Club Secretary, Mary Slattery. I wish both of them good luck as they steer the Club forward in the coming years. I want to thank Ollie Mulchrone for his work as Club Secretary for the past two years. The Coaching Officer, Michael Gavin, has also stood aside following seven years in the role. I wish to thank him for his dedication to the Club, and for his efforts in ensuring that our coaching standards were always of the highest standard. I want to wish his successor, John Reilly, well in his new role as Coaching Officer, and I'm confident he will endeavour to raise the bar a couple more notches in his pursuit of excellence.

I spoke last year about the difficulty in persuading people to take on roles in the management of the Club, and how a radical change was required in how people viewed the Club and its administration. Except for the post of assistant-treasurer, the Club was able to fill all official positions this year without too much difficulty. This role is still outstanding and needs to be urgently addressed.

As can be seen from our end of year financial report, the cost of running the Club is growing. In 2019 the Club's total expenditure was €71,509. When this amount is analysed, it works out at just under €1,400 each week. Transport and Public Liability insurance absorbed most of the Club's annual expenditure, plus the day-to-day expenses involved in keeping the Club open for business. Funding provided by way of donation from Councillor Brendan Mulroy (€5,000) and Councillor Christy Hyland (€1,500); the remainder of the finance to run the Club was made up from the weekly lotto, flag days, bucket collections and cash donations. To all who assisted in any way with the fundraising activities of the Club, a sincere thank you.

As can be seen from the various match reports, it has been a busy year for the Club on the playing fields around this County and at home in Kilmeena. I want to give a special mention to our U-14 girls this year on winning both the Championship and the League. It is a remarkable achievement in the six short years of the LGFA's existence, and one which gives the Club the springboard on which to build for the future. I wish to thank the Madden family for their sponsorship of tracksuits for this team. It was a practical gesture by the family and a fitting way to remember the loss of their daughter, Vivienne, whose 20th anniversary occurred this year.

I also must mention the U-16 boys and congratulate them on an outstanding season, which was capped off with a thrilling win over Achill in MacHale Park in August, to win the Division 3 County Championship.

I also must say well done to our U-21 team who defeated Ardroy McHales in Knockmore on December 1st in the County Final. It was a hard-fought encounter with the result in the melting pot until the last kick of the game.

I want to say "thank you" to all our coaches, both adult and underage. I say this each year, that you provide an invaluable service for the Club and the community, and the parish is all the more vibrant, and a better place because of what you do.

In addition to the Madden family, the Club was lucky to obtain sponsorship from other individuals and people in the area in 2019, and I want to acknowledge and thank them. Teddy McDonnell of Teddy's Fashions, Tile Warehouse, SuperValu Westport, and Joe Joyce Electrical Services. I must on behalf of the Club pay a huge "thank you" to Donal McIntyre for his sponsoring of the Club's annual Newsletter last year and again this year. Also, for his sponsorship of our recently launched document, the Club Plan for 2020 - 2023. This support is a significant commitment to the Club, and I want to thank him sincerely.

Without the generosity of our sponsors, it would unquestionably be more challenging to keep the Club afloat. In 2018 we submitted a further application for Sports Capital Funding. Unfortunately, in the past week, we received notification that our application was unsuccessful. That decision is now under appeal. It was the Club's intention that we would drain and level the main playing pitch if funding became available.

Finally, I want to thank everyone involved with the Club, in whatever capacity you have acted during the year. I want to especially thank the lotto sellers who are hugely instrumental in the effort of providing the general financing of the Club.

To my fellow Club Officers, who have served with me over the past seven years, I want to say a special thank you. For, without your support, my task as Chairman would have been a lot more demanding.

Personally, I regard it as an honour and a privilege, to have been entrusted by the members with the position of Chairman of the Club. I can reflect, with a sense of pride, on all that has been achieved during the tenure of my Chairmanship. I have enjoyed the experience immensely.

On behalf of the Club, I wish to extend festive greetings to all of you, whether at home or abroad. All the best for the Holy Season.

DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Kilmeena GAA Club's five-year Strategic Plan comes to an end in December 2019. It was the Club's first attempt at putting a Plan in place and mapping out the changes which the membership would wish to see taking place. There's no doubt that the Plan was a major success and a lot of the improved facilities on view at the Club have come about as a result of that five-year Plan.

With the expiry of the Plan in mind, the Club decided that we should now introduce a three-year Plan beginning in 2020 and running to 2023.

At the beginning of 2019, the Club held several meetings, culminating in an open meeting in September, where Club members were free to express their views on ideas that ought to be considered for inclusion in the Plan.

A steering committee later considered and prioritised those points that formed the basis for the Plan for the following three years. These included: Coaching and Games, Finance and Fundraising, Club Structures and Administration, Facilities and Development, Communications and Public Relations and Cultural Activities.

A Plan has now been formulated and printed, which will provide a platform for the continued development at our Club until 2023. The Plan was launched at the Club's AGM, held on November 23rd, 2019.

A copy of the Plan is available for virtually every house in the parish and are available from any of the Club Officers.

Thanks to Martin McIntyre for his help in preparing the Plan for printing and distribution. I also want to flag it now in good time that there will be a number of sub-committees set up shortly to drive the principal areas so that the goals outlined will be achieved. 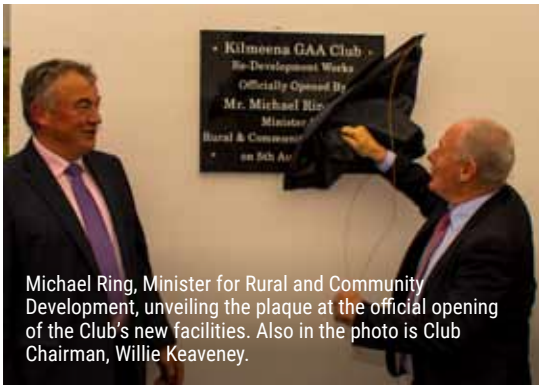
He thanked the principal financial backers who contributed to the project – the Connacht Council, Allergan

He thanked Minister Ring for allocating €80,000 for the project when he was the Minister of State at the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport with Special Responsibility for Tourism and Sport and the Club members who raised €155,000, which for a small rural Club is a massive accomplishment.

The Club achieved all this without any borrowings or bank loans. He also thanked the Club sponsors, the people at various times of the year who sponsor playing attire for the various teams etc. He thanked fellow Club members for their support, and the design team of Robert Kilkelly and Gavin Joyce for all their help and advice. He also thanked the main contractor for the project, John Foran and Emerald Pitch Development from Offaly.

Minister Ring then unveiled the plaque and cut the tape to declare the opening

officially. Following the opening ceremony, refreshments were served upstairs in the Club House. At this point, the Chairman thanked those who assisted with the serving and preparation of sandwiches and home-baking, Ollie Mulchrone for taking the photographs, and grounds personnel for ensuring the facilities looked their best for the occasion.

Kilmeena GAA Club is 130 years in existence, and it has had to endure its share of good and bad times, however, this was a proud day in the life of the Club!

Many Moneyglass families also travelled down and stayed locally in hotels and B&Bs. New friendships forged over the weekend proved a huge success and demonstrated all that is best with our Club.



Day One:

Kilmeena's Féile weekend kicked off on Friday, June 29th in Swinford. Our first game was against St. Colum's of Cork. We had a poor start to the game and were 2-1 to no score down after three minutes.

Our boys dug in from there and fought back to lead 2-6 to 2-1 at half-time. After the break, we added extra points to gain what looked like a comfortable lead. In the last quarter, we started to tire and St. Colum's fought back to give an exciting final five minutes, but in the end, we held out to win 2-11 to 2-6.

In our second game against Swinford, we started strong and pushed on to the finish and a comprehensive win. Swinford suffered four injuries in their first game and seemed to feel the effects of back-to-back games. We played nearly our full panel throughout the game, and all the lads played brilliantly leaving lots of headaches for the selectors for the following day.





Day Two:

On Saturday morning, we played our final group game at home against our guest club, St.Ergnat's of Moneyglass, Co Antrim

Kilmeena made excellent use of the ideal conditions, producing an expansive brand of football which included some excellent scores and some diligent defending. We were delighted that all members of the team got game time to showcase their skills. Kilmeena advanced comfortable winners and topped their group with three wins from three. Due to these results

Kilmeena advanced to play in the Cup competition while St. Ergnat's qualified for the shield competition. The Club provided refreshments for both teams in the clubhouse immediately after the game, providing an excellent opportunity to meet and greet the families from St.Ergnat's.

In the afternoon, our lads then departed for Castlebar, for our quarter-final against Glenuilin of Co. Derry. This game was played at an intense pace with Kilmeena starting the brightest with an early goal. Kilmeena

were then struck a blow when influential midfielder Daniel Kelly had to leave the field of play with an injury. The Ulster side then got a foothold in the game and went into the half-time break with a slender advantage on the scoreboard. The unsavoury scenes by the visiting supporters in the stand were not in keeping with the spirit of the competition. This hostility spilled onto the pitch at the end of the game, creating





a degree of shock and disappointment with the Kilmeena supporters, management and players.

Later that evening the Club held our Féile social evening in Gracy's bar at Westport House. This event gave us an excellent opportunity to again mix and chat with our visiting club members.

After witnessing another stressful Mayo victory on the TV screens, a short presentation ceremony was held in the bar. Mementoes of the weekend were exchanged to commemorate a successful weekend both on and off the pitch. Thanks to all who made this great weekend possible.

Both sets of players also received Féile commemorative t-shirts which were generously sponsored by David O'Grady.

On Sunday morning, the Kilmeena host families returned the St Ergnat's players to their parents in Westport before they headed off to Islandeady to play in their semi-final and later the final in Westport.

Annual U-10 Paddy Golden Memorial Blitz

The annual Kilmeeena GAA Club U-10 Paddy Golden Memorial Blitz was held on Saturday, June 22nd 2019.

The freshly painted grounds and manicured pitches looked immaculate as the sun shone down on the large crowd of players, supporters and volunteers who participated in this festival of football for all the GAA clubs in West Mayo.

Thirty-six teams with approximately 400 boys and girls took part.

Six teams took part in the "A" competition with Ballintubber and Parke topping the initial round in their respective groups. Closely fought semi-finals saw 13 goals and 18 points scored between Ballintubber v Balla, and Castlebar v Parke. Castlebar and Ballintubber qualified for the "A" final. The "A" final was a repeat of the opening game in Group 1 but this time the result was reversed with Castlebar emerging victorious on a score line of 5-5 to 1-7.

Twelve teams, divided into three equal groups of four teams, contested the "B" section. After the initial rounds, Kilmeeena, Ballintubber and Tourmakeady topped their respective groups. Due to scoring aggregate, Ballintubber got a bye to the final. Kilmeeena and Tourmakeady battled out a defensively strong, low scoring game which Tourmakeady won by 2-2 to 1-2. The "B" final again was a close game with Tourmakeady getting the better of Ballintubber by 2-2 to 0-3.



Section C was made up of eight teams with two groups of four. Ballintubber and Burrishoole contested the "C" final. This contest again was a tight competitive game with Burrishoole winning by 2 - 02 to 4 - 06.

As the number of girls playing football continues to grow in the West Mayo clubs, we had a record number of teams register for this year's event. The girls' competition was divided into "A" and "B" sections, both consisting of two groups of five teams. Westport and Islandeady qualified for the "A" final with Westport winning by 3 - 05 to 1 - 01. Kilmeena and Tourmakeady qualified for the B final. This was a close game with the host Club outscoring Tourmakeady by 3 - 04 to 2 - 04

Over 50 games were played with presentations completed before 3 pm. Well done to all the boys and girls that participated in the Blitz and congratulations to the winning teams. Before the final presentations our Club Chairman, Mr Willie Keaveney, held a minutes' silence as a mark of respect to our former Clubman, Mick Burke, who sadly passed away on Thursday the 20th June.

A huge community effort is put into making the U10 Paddy Golden Memorial Blitz successful. It takes a massive effort to plan and run this event. 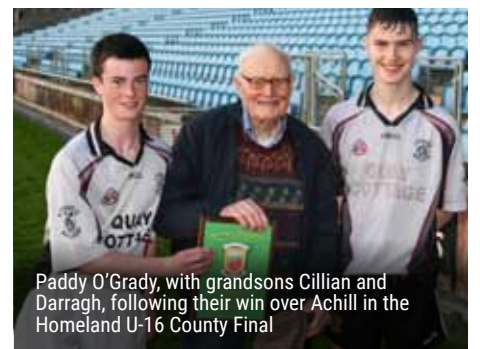
All said, it was a very enjoyable and successful season with a bunch of players who got better and better as the season progressed.

Having appeared on 'The Late Late Show', 'Up For The Match', 'The Imelda May Show', 'The Gathering' and numerous times on Irish TV, the band has also performed live with Imelda May, The Chieftains, Mundy, Damien Dempsey, Jack L and Gene Butler.

Added to their list of achievements, the band have recently recorded with Matt Molloy and Imelda May. In early 2015 'Tears of Clew Bay' by Imelda May and The Clew Bay Pipe Band reached number four in the Irish Charts. The band performed with Imelda at her sell-out shows in Vicar Street, The Marquee Cork and The 3 Arena along with special guest Jeff Beck.

Voted 'Best Act' at the 2014 Westport Festival of Music and Food, audiences have raved about their 'Pipe-Versity Show'!

A fusion of Piping, Drumming, Rock, Traditional and Choral music awaits those who come to see the band perform. The Bands first CD "Pipe-Versity" live from Westport Town Hall was a huge success. Pipe-Versity shows have 'sold out' wherever the band has performed both nationally and internationally.

The Clew Bay Pipe Band were the headline act this August at the Criou Celtic Festival in Samoëns, France. The band enthralled huge audiences throughout the festival which culminated in performing to a sell-out concert of over 1400 people. Such was their appeal that the Clew Bay Pipe Band have been invited back to headline the festival in August 2020.

The band has once again been invited back to play at Temple Bar Trad Fest at the end of January and looks forward to entertaining the locals and tourists alike.

Twenty-five members of the band are also members of Kilmeena GAA Club. The band performed at the Club's 125th Anniversary celebrations and members of the band regularly play the National Anthem on the Pipes before championship matches. 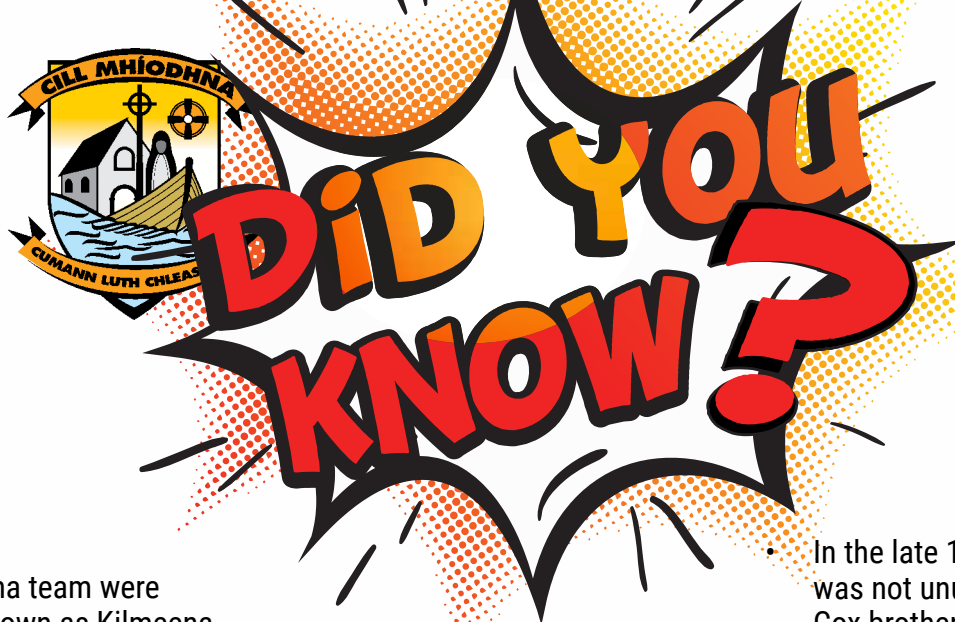

- The Kilmeena team were variously known as Kilmeena "Sarsfields" and Kilmeena "Granuailes" in 1912.
- Four pairs of football boots cost the club £6 in 1951. This money was raised from dances and plays run during the year by the club.
- In 1952 and '53 Kilmeena had an active Camogie club with up to thirty six players actively participating in weekly training sessions and matches.
- In 1964 a handball club was formed in Kilmeena. That year Tommy Cox and Willie McNamee reached the County Final.
- Kilmeena minors amalgamated with Islandeady in 1967.
- During a junior Championship match against Louisburgh Padraig Mulloy got injured and had to go off leaving only 14 players to finish the first half. The referee for the game, Paddy Golden, handed over his whistle and played the second half with Kilmeena.
- Mayo won 6 consecutive National League titles from 1934 to 1939.
- Kilmeena won the Pete McDonnell Cup for the first time in 1977. The cost of the match programme for the 1977 Junior County Final was 10 pence.
- Michael Gavin, being "best man" at his brother Padraig's wedding, had to leave the wedding reception to play the West Mayo Junior Football Final against Breaffy in Westport.
- Kilmeena beat Balla in the 2001 West Mayo Junior Final on a score of line of 2-12 to 1-09. John Moore scored 9 points.
- The Kilmeena U-16 team won the Cushlough tournament in 1984 with Padraig Moore as captain.
- Kilmeena won a West Mayo Minor "B" title in 1986.
- Kilmeena played in the St. Judes Junior Sevens All Ireland Final in 1994 where they were narrowly beaten by An Ghaeltacht.
- The Kilmeena Goal keeper Michael Mulchrone saved two penalties in the 1993 County Junior semi Final match against Hollymount.
- In the late 1930's / early 40's it was not unusual for five of the Cox brothers from Mayour line out together on the Kilmeena team –Michael Joe, Jim, Marty, Frank and Pakie (Tommy being the younger would make his mark at a later stage).
- The 2001 County Junior Semi Final between Kilmeena and Shrule / Glencorrib had to go to extra time in a replay match in McHale Park. Kilmeena ended the game in normal time with 13 players after two were sent off. Twenty year old Davy Feehan scored 6 points in extra time (9 in total) to leave the final score reading 2-13 to 0-16 in favour of Kilmeena.
- Conor Madden, Sean Barrett and Kieran Golden were the three Kilmeena mascots who marched around Macartans Pipe Band for the All Ireland Junior club Final field alongside their team and behind the the St Macartans Pipe Band.

Ellen's reduction in handicap enabled her to be one of only six girls from Connacht to qualify and compete in the national ILGU Junior U-18 Medal finals at Seapoint Golf Club in Co. Louth in October. Ellen finished in the top half of the field in both her handicap category (0-20) and the overall rankings, despite carrying a wrist injury from playing in the Girls U-14 County League final days before. This achievement was not Ellen's only national fulfilment though in 2019; she also wore the green and red of her beloved Mayo in the National Community Games finals in Limerick. Ellen competed strongly to secure a silver medal in the U-16 Girls Pitch and Putt, only losing out on the gold medal on the countback.

On the provincial stage, Ellen finished third in the Leinster U-18 Girls "Ria Kenny Trophy" in June, at Elm Park in Dublin; she also won the prestigious "Bentley Plate" at the Connacht U-16 Girls Trophy in July at Tuam Golf Club. Such is Ellen's dedication to the Kilmeena U-14 Girls, on that same day, putting her first Championship Golf win celebrations on hold, she raced home to play a U-14 Girls football match in Foxford.

A secondary school student attending the Sacred Heart School in Westport, she led the school team to silver medal place in the Irish School Girls Junior Championship at Castlerea Golf Club in September.

Ellen's championship travels have also seen her play in Lahinch and Lough Erne - two world-class golf courses during 2019. 2020 will bring many more exciting outings for this talented young golfer. Ellen has also been a member of the ILGU Connacht Girls U-18 Development Panel in 2019, where she has gained considerable experience in the company of her golfing peers.

Ellen has worn a path to the Presentation Table at Westport Golf Club in 2019. She is a tremendous ambassador for the Club's successful Golf4Girls4Life programme, which has seen more than 40 young girls enrol in its first year during 2019.

Ellen, like many of her Kilmeena teammates, demonstrates that all our young girls can excel in as many sports as they wish when they set their minds to it. In fact, the wider variety of sports they play, the greater the skill set and big day experience they can bring to the table for the benefit of the entire Club.

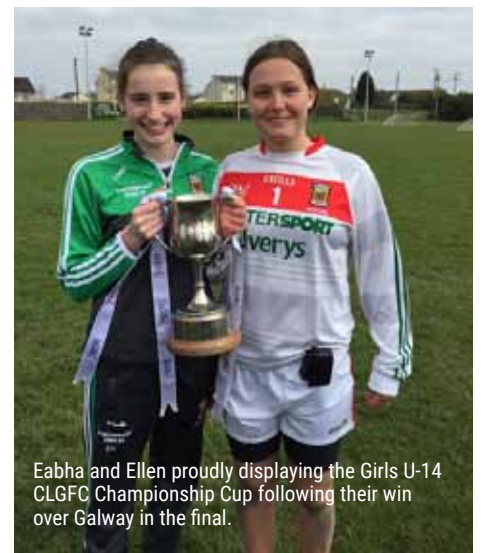
Our Mayo Ladies: Eabha Carney and Ellen O'Toole

2019 was a tremendous year for Eabha Carney and Ellen O'Toole. The girls created history with their Club in winning both the U-14 Girls League and Championship titles, the first silverware for the ladies since the establishment of the LGFA in 2013. For this small Club, these girls generated more excitement when both girls were chosen to play for the County Mayo U-14 team. It was a very tough process that started in August 2018 and for both girls to make it to the final panel of 30, reduced from 200, was a super accomplishment. It is a real achievement to have two girls from the Kilmeena LGFA Club, wearing the green and red jersey for Mayo this year.

They played their first U-14 games with Mayo in February, playing two challenge matches away to Clare and Limerick, winning both. In March they played at the Connacht Girls U-14 Blitz in Began beating Sligo, Galway and Roscommon. In April they contested the Connacht "A" U-14 Girls Final against Galway. This final was an exciting game that went to extra time. Neither side could win after an additional half-hour of football, so the game ended with a "point" shoot-out. The Mayo girls being more accurate ended up taking the cup home.

In May the girls travelled to Cavan for an All-Ireland U-14 Girls Blitz where they beat Longford, Wicklow and Leitrim. Also in May, they played the "A" U-14 Girls Championship in Clonberne playing Kerry, Meath and Sligo. They lost the quarter-final to Galway to bring their county season for 2019 to an end.

Their selection for Mayo is undoubtedly a triumph for individuality and recognition of their talents. Hopefully, we will see both these girls wearing the green and red again for their county in 2020.

MEMORIES FROM THE EAST

I want to start by thanking the club for asking me to put together a few words on my playing time with the Kilmeena GAA Club and with other clubs on my travels since then. Words cannot capture what the GAA means to me and the importance of being a member of the club in Kilmeena. The GAA goes beyond the players on the pitch, or the matches played. It represents where we come from, who we grew up with, who we met along the way, and the friendships we established and sustained throughout life. Kilmeena has everything a club and community can be proud of.

It's important to acknowledge the many people who took the time to train and develop myself and others as players; from Walter Cox, Jim Browne, Willie Quinn, Bill Hopkins, Martin McIntyre, Kevin Barrett, Joe Moore, Michael Ryan, Pdraig Golden, Michael Gavin and many more who gave so generously of their time. Apologies to those who I may have left out in the list.

It's also important to acknowledge one of the significant aspects of the club and that of many GAA clubs around Ireland and the world: the volunteers and community that show up in all conditions to support the team and club on match days. As an underage player, it was commonplace to see Paddy Keane, John Moran, Mr. O'Grady, Hugh Feehan, the Mulchrone's, Maddens, McIntyres, Quinns, Goldens, Moores, Gibbons, the Ryan clan and many more supporting on the sidelines. During the recent celebration of the 125th anniversary and the Clubhouse opening ceremony, the same people were in the crowd, always showing up, still proud and always supporting the club. They would never let you down. When we need to look for role models, we need to look no further than these people as examples of everything that is great about the west of Ireland and community spirit.

I started playing for the U-12 team and played up to minor, with my last match being against Breaffy in Parke's pitch in a West Mayo semi-final in the early '90s. We lost, and little did I know that this would be my last match in the Kilmeena jersey. College and injuries meant I did not play

GAA again until 1996 when I joined Naomh Olaf's in Dublin. This return to play was only for a short time as I was eventually told to quit football on medical advice.

It took until 2008 when I arrived for work in Brussels before I took up football again and began my adventure into European GAA. I arrived into a club on the way up, with members from many corners of Ireland and the world. We were blessed to have a great coach in Dave Barrett from Kinsale, Co. Cork. He wasn't always the easiest of individuals to deal with and the Cork/Mayo philosophies didn't always align. Still, time is a great healer, and we now laugh about those days and the importance of doing the "donkey work", preparing to win and getting the team over the line. I genuinely believe Dave has everything it takes to someday play a role in coaching at county level.

Playing in Europe has taken me to places from Clare Island (playing for Belgium GAA) to Copenhagen, Zurich, Vienna, Rome and many more European cities. In this time I've played for Belgium, Geneva and the Hague (Den Haag GAA) clubs and for the past two years I've trained the Hague team along with David Padden from Belmullet. We became known as the "Pat & Noel" of European GAA. As two great servants of Mayo football, I'll take that as a compliment.

There are over 90 clubs in Europe these days, and it's growing every year, with great work being done by the likes of Mary Gavin (Moylough Montbellew) and Tony Bass (Cuala) amongst others. While today Kilmeena is a thriving club at many levels, it took me until 2015 to win my first GAA medal. A GAA team from Geneva – with a Kilmeena/Castlebar half back line, a Killalla full forward and a few pints still on board from the night before - defeated the might of Moscow Shamrocks in the European Junior "B" Fnal. A great day for the parish of Geneva.

As a Mayo supporter and ever the optimist, I still hold out hope that on the back of some strong performances in Europe, JP Sheridan might someday give me the call. Pat Mulchrone tells me that the wait might be a while longer due to JP still getting used to modern technology and figuring how to add me to the "WhatsApp" group!

As with many from the club and the wider Mayo GAA community, I long for the day that Mayo will win the All-Ireland. I moved to Poland in early 2001, and my wife Ewelina had to quickly adapt to the fact that GAA had a major part in my life with FBD matches, league matches and the quest for Sam Maguire an annual journey. For many years I would listen to most of the games on the internet, with the commentary from Mícheál Ó Muircheartaigh or Midwest radio. It took Ewelina a while to adapt to Championship time and Mayo football, and she was always mesmerised by "the man with the strange accent".

This man was Mícheál Ó Muircheartaigh, a great person with an ability to bring the match and atmosphere into our homes many thousands of kilometres away. Down through the years, we've got to attend GAA matches together from U-21 games in early spring to summer Championship days, with each day being unique and special. So far each year when Ewelina asks: "How did Mayo do today?" The conversation typically moves to: "Hard luck and maybe next year." I have no doubt that quality footballers exist in Mayo and that the day a Mayo captain climbs the steps of the Hogan Stand to lift the Sam Maguire is not far off.

While winning Sam Maguire remains a goal, one of the proudest moments I had in recent years was when the Mayo Masters team won the All-Ireland. That day I listened in on Midwest radio to the historic win. On that day, when Ewelina asked how Mayo had done, I was proud to tell her we had won. And not only that, Pat Mulchrone had captained the team with Club colleagues Kieran Hastings, Declan Ryan and Darren Madden playing their part as well.

I played with these lads from U-12 up, and you could not ask to take the field with a nicer bunch of lads. Seeing Pat and the lads still going strong in their mid-40s is mighty, and a great credit to them and those around them. Long may it continue. I don't think we ever retire from the GAA. It remains a part of us. Wherever we are, we will always be drawn into it to play or participate in some manner and pass on the tradition to the next generation and people from other nations who want to take up the sport.

In August 1989, sitting in the Cusack Stand, Mayo had just beaten Tyrone in the All-Ireland semi-final to qualify for their first All-Ireland Final in 38 years. Dad turned to me and said: "My job is now done, I'll get yourself and Cian tickets for the final."

It was the last time we attended a match together, but over the previous 16 years, he had made sure we travelled the roads following Mayo through the good and bad times. When we won, we celebrated, and when we lost, we congratulated the opposition and were gracious in defeat. Because at the end of the day, it's a sport we all love, and it brings us together.

I hope I can also leave this legacy.
